A Note From Dr. Scarlett

More than three years ago, we set out to make veterinary care more accessible for pets in our community and to address overcrowding in animal shelters statewide. At that time, the suspension of spay and neuter services due to Covid-19 shutdowns, coupled with a nationwide veterinarian shortage, reversed many of our state's gains in animal welfare. The result has been an overwhelming number of animals entering and living in California shelters.

Despite these challenges, we continue to make progress on our vision. In fiscal year 2024, we increased our commitment to access to care for San Francisco's pets by 30%, providing millions of dollars in free and reduced-fee veterinary services through our Community Veterinary Clinic, Mobile Vaccine Clinic, discounted public spay and neuter surgeries, and hospital financial-aid programs.

In response to the crisis, we've not only increased subsidies for spay and neuter surgeries in San Francisco, but we've expanded our services into the Central Valley, where access to veterinary care is extremely limited. We have continued to deepen our shelter partnerships there, providing ongoing transport of animals, high-volume spay/neuter clinics, and free public vaccine clinics.

2024 was also a banner year for our advocacy work toward these goals, as we advocated successfully for new legislation that will enhance access to veterinary care statewide. We also innovated new animal-welfare programs such as the first-ever California Adopt-a-Pet Day.

It's thanks to your dedication and generosity that we were able to achieve these remarkable achievements. Read on to find out how your support this year made a difference for animals, their people, and our communities.

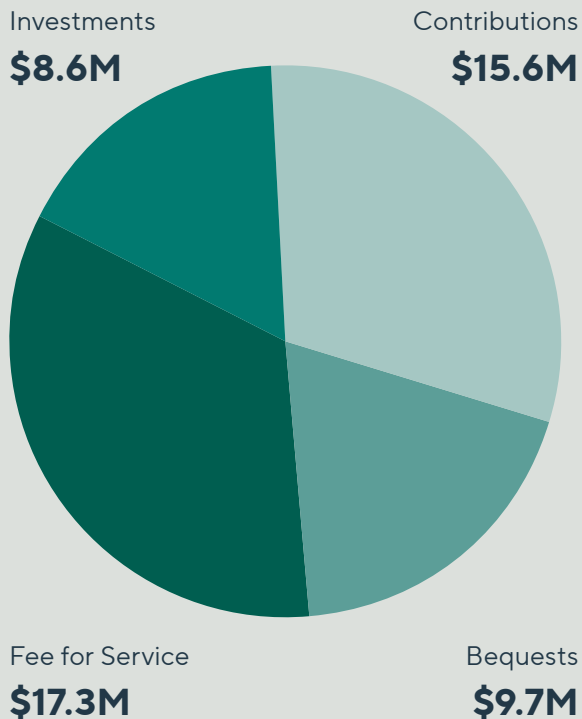


With your support, we provided more than **\$3.5M** in free and reduced-cost veterinary care to the San Francisco community.

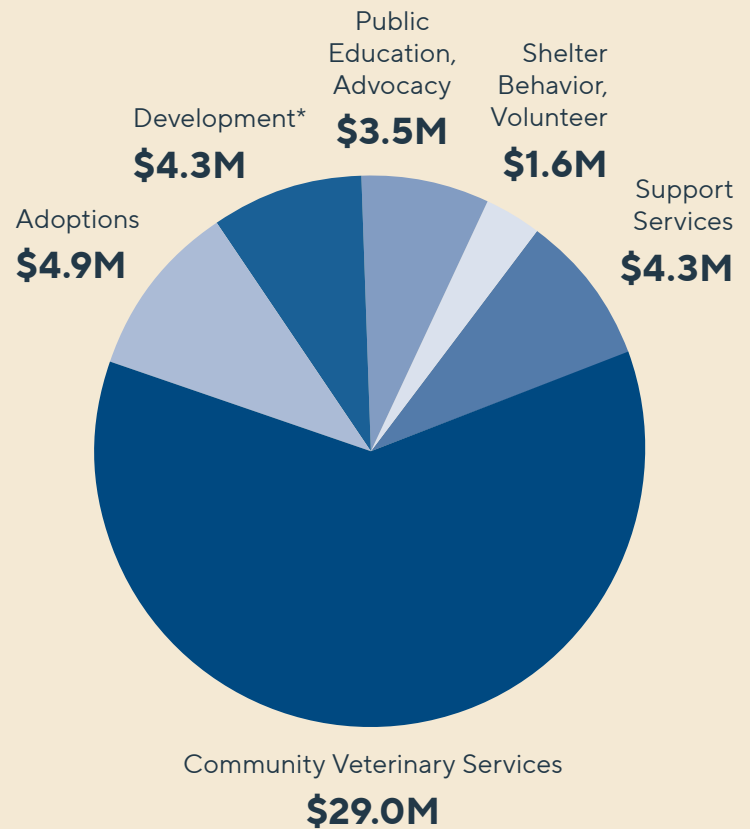
We provided direct services for **27,378** animals and **20,606** humans.

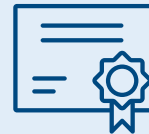
